

According to the Iceland Ocean Cluster's research, the yield achieved in Iceland from cod is around 80%, compared to the 45-50% yield in other countries. The target is to reach a 100% yield. Icelandic cod is comprehensively utilised in a variety of products and many of these can be seen here, including cosmetics, pharmaceutical goods, fashion accessories and much else.


Renewed focus

Repeatedly it is presented how great a portion of fish is utilized in Iceland compared to elsewhere. By utilizing a larger part of each fish and through careful handling, more value is extracted from each cod in Iceland than in any other country.

Smaller catch - bigger gains

Another great example of the achievements in the industry is that export value has doubled during the period between 1981 and 2011 in Iceland even though cod landings declined by 60%. In recent years there have been a number of startups in the marine industry, especially at the top end of the value chain, such as cosmetic, medical and supplement companies with products made from marine resources. These companies further add to the value of our catch.

DOUBLE VALUE FOR 60% SMALLER CATCH

Through product innovation and a focus on quality instead of quantity, Iceland managed to double export revenues from cod despite a reduction in landings by 60%.

In place of mostly whole frozen cod, Iceland now exports an array of valuable products to various markets around the world.
